The association, collaboration and member

Now we are in November, the first month of winter. It has been frosty and actually a bit of rain mixed with snow. All you have to do is bring out the snow sled and the snow shovels and wait for winter, which is coming. We have winter time now too. I thought that our joint monthly column would be about the association, the individual and the team! It can be translated to the work in the association, you and me as individual members and last but not least cooperation or teamwork.

CV online - post CV or link to CV

An initial consideration once again regarding the CV that we decided a long time ago should be online. We are missing CVs from many members. Surely all members have a CV that can be posted? It should be a simple thing to fix for seasoned academics. Now we all take the plunge and post our resumes or simply post a link. Our website is our face to the outside world. If 50% of the members have a CV and the rest of them don't, it gives a strange and somewhat unprofessional impression. Online CV means that other members can reach out and contact you for exciting projects. If we visit the minister and he goes online and finds that we can't even post CVs, that's not good. The internal communication pattern – why is it the way it is? How can we clean it up and get some decent routines?

Our current communication pattern contributes to the "internal mess". Members write emails about big and small issues to the entire Board. We receive complaints from those who are disturbed by mass emailing. You don't always have to hit the 'reply all' and you don't have to send the entire previous conversation. Can't we just try to respect each other so much that we don't send everything to everyone?

What does our email policy look like?

How do we want to use e-mail in Strömstad Academy? A good collaboration can only be created through effective communication. The best proven way to avoid misunderstandings is to have personal, ie. physical, conversations and it is a pity that we can't have frequent physical and personal conversations. Video conferencing is problematic. Technical hassle, hard to hear and sometimes also hard to see. In e-mail communication, it is difficult to pay attention to body language and tone of voice. Prioritizing two-way communication, ie. that listening to others, is not easy. Instead, you have to think about what you should write/say next. We should also stick to facts that everyone has experience with and can relate to. A story is actually your own interpretation of the situation described. Then we should also make sure we are talking to the right person as well. The Vice-Chancellor handles all academic matters in Strömstad Academy. The Chairman takes all Board matters. Poor communication occurs when you talk to the wrong people, about the wrong things and in the wrong context. Surely we should be able to improve our internal communication??

Democratic processes in Strömstad Academy are the hub

Association democracy is an important part of Strömstad Academy's way of functioning. Association democracy means, among other things, that the association's members govern the association by voting on issues where agreement cannot otherwise be reached. Democracy in an association is exercised through an association general meeting/annual meeting, which in most associations is held once a year. Each member's vote at the annual general meeting then carries equal weight. This is also the case in Strömstad Academy. Democracy means that the majority decides, not an individual member. This applies both to the Board and the Annual Meeting. The only exception is that the Chairman alone determines the agenda at board meetings. In Strömstad Academy, however, the agenda is discussed first in the working/executive committee. It is the members of Strömstad Academy who at the Annual Meeting decide on the regulations of the association (statutes), and each member has one vote there. The Annual Meeting also decides on other regulatory documents where decisions are delegated to different functions, all to reduce bureaucracy and give the members maximum opportunities to devote themselves to the business.


Quality

This segment is partly based on an article that Per wrote on Tvärtänkt. In it he discusses the relationship between rules, quality and administration. We have process descriptions and would be able to ensure quality according to ISO-9000 with not too much effort. This increases our chances of being qualified as grant recipients. But our results, our publications and our webinars do not improve because of that. There are other things that will affect this area: Knowledge, being well-read, boldness and originality are important factors for our writings to be read and appreciated. Some of us believe that this is enough and that our books sell themselves if they are good enough. We do not agree with them. It is not sufficient to write high quality articles, they must also be read. If more people appreciate what is said/published, it will spill over to SA. And of course the reverse applies: Bad quality results in a bad reputation.

What makes people read an article? The title is what you first see and it determines whether you want to continue. Take e.g. these two titles from a publication list: 1. Systems Developers: Preoccupations, Knowledge and Power; 2. Becoming Professor with almost no publications. The first was written in 1990 and has 13 downloads. The second was written in 2017 and has 2,683 downloads. The title of the second article is much more interesting than the first, although the content itself can be just as interesting in both articles. So we should probably put quite a lot of care into selling titles. To paraphrase Nils Ferlin: Of course we also write for entertainment venues!

Per has been thinking that we should publish a magazine once or twice a year. It must be interdisciplinary, have a theme for each issue and be of at least AAS quality. Basically, it's an anthology. It will hopefully activate several of our members, we have the opportunity to get the magazine listed in some of the big databases and thus become known. The Royal Library has a page, "Publish", where you can publish your journal free of charge, provided that you do not charge for publishing articles or for reading them.

Apart from the quality problems, we have the economy, which is divided into two areas: 1. Applying for grants 2. Recruiting members and getting them to pay the membership fee. The last thing: Getting people to pay means that at the beginning of the year we send out an invoice, which says which amount to be paid and what paying options are available. This should be a physical document sent out by mail. It costs a few thousand Swedish kroner but can be worth the effort. Then you should periodically remind those who are lethargic and after May 30 they will have no right to vote at the Annual Meeting. Recruiting new members



is connected to making SA known. We consider high quality and interesting publications to be the key.

In summary, everything is connected and Per has made a systems theory analysis of the whole thing, see figure above. What everything depends on is that SA becomes known and appreciated. If the goal is for seniors to be able to continue researching and teaching, this means that they want to publish themselves and be read. An interesting publication with a good title is the first step. However, the content must be good and it requires a review based on clear and strict criteria. Many rejects are equated with high quality, but probably lead to fewer members wanting to write. We believe that it is precisely the opportunity to publish their ideas that drives many people, even if they do not recover afterwards. We would suggest that, in principle, we do not refuse, but instead have many major revisions and where we are helped to guide the author. The problem is our interdisciplinary nature with completely different criteria in different subjects. According to the analysis, surprisingly, criteria for review of AAS articles is the most important thing to do if the Academy is to develop

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Marketing is also such an activity and here we just want to point out the importance of both marketing the Academy and also our publications. Titles are greatly undervalued, we must have extremely attractive titles for our publications, not just traditional academic and descriptive ones. The negative factors associated with academia are troubling ourselves perhaps the most. At the same time, we must have high ceilings and we have a statutory freedom of expression. But it is important that we always point out that the members' statements are their own and not the Academy's. However, history has shown that sometimes it was the weirdos (Copernicus, Galileo, Einstein) that were right and the establishment that was wrong. But most weirdos are just that, weirdos.

Science Festival 2024 -06-10 -- 13

The Vice-Chancellor and Pro-Vice-Chancellor have decided that the Science Festival will take place on June 10-13. It is now clear that we can be in Skagerack, but we have also booked Fars sal on Monday and cafe Guldtuppen in the afternoon/evening. There is a planning group consisting of four members: Lasse Broman, Peter Fritzell, Rosa Jörgensson and Sveza Filipova Daceva. It is a very good group with strong local connections. The war continues unhindered. In October, another conflict started with the terrorist sect Hamas' attack, killing 1,400 Israeli civilians and visitors. Israel's response, as expected, has been very harsh.
