Per Flensburg: A Christmas treat

A Christmas treat

It's a quarter past eleven on Christmas Eve. I just finished watching midnight mass from Rome. Not that I'm particularly religious, but it was a tradition in my previous family and I uphold it from time to time. This year, the Pope gave a very nice sermon where he started from the two themes of the Christmas Gospel: The tax collection and the birth of Jesus. He thought it was remarkable that the gospel spent so much time on the tax collection, it would have been enough to mention it in passing. But the Pope saw the tax collections as a way of counting heads, while the birth of Jesus meant seeing the face of the individual person. He described an administrative, dividing and calculating approach and a human, humanitarian and spiritual opposite. Unsurprisingly, he felt that more of the latter was needed.

Earlier we had had an interesting discussion in the family about all the misery in the world and who gained from it. The arms industry was a given winner, but we never found out if it was really them that initiated all the wars we see in the world. However, the oil industry is largely to blame for climate work going so slowly, so the risk that the earth will become uninhabitable for our grandchildren is imminent. Short-term, monetary gains outweigh the future of humanity. Why is it like that? Are the oil sheikhs so ignorant that they don't see how they are thwarting the future of their family? They are greedy, but not stupid. Maybe the Pope's idea of tax collection versus humanity can explain part of the matter?

Before I get to this interesting question, I want to address two concepts I read about many years ago in a book by the Norwegian sociologist, Dag Østerberg. The name of the book was Förståelseformer (Comprehension patterns) and it was published by Korpens publishing house in the late 70s. His concept was exterior and interior thinking. While the exterior thinking is based on catalog logic, i.e. the Pope's tax collection, the interior thinking is based on analogy and dialog, i.e. the logic that, according to the Pope's opinion, should be a consequence of the Christian faith, manifested in the birth of Jesus. Now, there are countless examples of religion, based on a message of peace, leading to horrible atrocities. Think of the crusades, witch-burnings, the 30-year war and for that matter the current war between Hamas and Israel. Admittedly none of the latter are particularly peace-seeking, but they use religion as a justification for horrible atrocities.

Our Christmas dinner discussion wavered back and forth and of course we didn't solve the world's problems, but I came to the conclusion that a contributing cause of the misery in the world is our tendency to sort people and things into compartments. We generalize the individual to fit into a special compartment. Example: Muslims oppress women, Swedes, especially the Sweden Democrats, burn the Koran, young immigrants shoot around wildly, business directors, especially bank directors, only think about quick bonuses and ignore the environment, etc. I want to emphasize that these are templates, and gross generalizations and I don't condone any of them. But - and now I act inappropriately - doesn't science deal with generalizations? Doesn't it generate templates into which it inserts its survey objects? Doesn't science contribute, at least indirectly, to the catalog thinking that taxes the world?

Having come this far in my thinking. I return to the oil sheikhs and wonder if they are aware that their actions are thwarting the future of their dynasties, indeed all of humanity? I actually don't think so. My opinion is based on the fact that in the 70s I worked as a night watchman at Addo in Malmö. Addo made advanced mechanical calculators that could handle all four methods of calculation. My parents had one of these in their office and when divided, it would hold on for a long time and hiss and spin and the rods with numbers would go up and down with a terrible noise. As we know, these monsters were outcompeted by electronic calculators that, at a fraction of the price, did the same thing much faster and quieter. But when I talked to the guys at the factory, they said that these electronic calculators didn't stand a chance against Addo's calculators, which were durable and trouble-free and based on a well-known technology. These views were filtered through all the reports sent to the management, which consequently achieved a distorted view of reality and that's how it went: Addo went bankrupt. This was later described to me as the gate-keeper phenomenon. We see something similar with our sheikhs: Information about the climate crisis and the significance of oil in this respect is downplayed, trivialized and even omitted by their subordinates.

A similar process takes place in the major oil companies. It is important for the owners to show bright future prospects and continue the share dividend. Consequently, the gate-keeper phenomenon kicks in here as well and Earth continues to be destroyed. The tax collection works on! But many industry leaders have realized that the catalog logic does not hold up. We cannot keep taxing the Earth but must engage in dialog with the evil forces and convince them that they are wrong. We can't just be outside, we have an inside too.

As a researcher, you should ask yourself the question: What is this due to? Are there any changes in society that lead to these phenomena? I want to remind you of the talk I gave at Strömstad Academy's Science Festival in 2019. There I claimed that a number of extensive paradigm shifts took place during the period 1970-1990 in many sciences. But then it was the other way around from a catalog perspective to an analogical/dialectical one. It is now close at hand to speculate about whether this is a recurring phenomenon and if so, what is

driving it? The matter is, in my opinion, worthy of investigation and it is very likely that I will begin such an investigation. However, I need help with that and therefore invite you, Dear Reader, to participate in this excursion into the history of ideas in human society.

Åsa Morberg: Sweden should leave the PISA survey

Sweden should leave the PISA survey

We have been able to read about the results of the latest PISA survey of the Swedish youth. The Minister of Education characterizes the results as "a historic loss of knowledge" and uses the results of PISA for political purposes. The government has made several efforts to raise the knowledge results in Swedish schools and to strengthen the conditions for the students who face the greatest challenges.

The government's measures are about increased state control of the school system and a complete renovation of the independent school system, investments in security and study peace as well as several different changes to ensure that students acquire basic skills in reading, writing and arithmetic at an early age. The government has also helped finance more special teachers, special teaching groups and school social teams. A review of teacher training has also announced.

Let me start by describing PISA (Programme for International Student Assessment). It endeavours to measure how 15-years-old pupils in different nations are "equipped to meet the future" when leaving school. The project is run by OECD and focuses on four areas: math, science, reading comprehension, and solving problems. OECD has been established to further economic and general development by exchange of ideas end experience in areas which are important for the economic development of democratic nations with a market economy, particularly within the 38 member states. Its head office is located in Paris.

PISA cannot, in my opinion, measure how well our Swedish 15-year-olds are equipped to meet the future. The PISA examinations are conducted every three years. The goal of the PISA project is to test and evaluate the performance of school pupils around the world. An underlying purpose of the surveys is to be able to develop better teaching methods and better results. What methodological development has PISA actually achieved? How can better methods be developed based on a simple survey? What methods have been improved through the PISA surveys? How can PISA's impact on method development be controlled?

The test is carried out having 5,000 students from each country can take the test, which takes two hours. What conclusions can one really draw from a study based on a sample of students answering a number of questions during two hours? The attention that PISA receives indicates, in my opinion, an overconfidence in what conclusions can be drawn from the study's results.

Since PISA's start in the late 90s, the results of the PISA surveys have received more and more attention in the media. Every time the results of the latest PISA survey are published, countless articles are written with dramatic headlines, such as "Sweden worst in class" and "PISA shock". From the ministry, we can now read headlines such as "Historical loss of knowledge!" According to the Minister of Education, Swedish pupils' skills have greatly deteriorated in mathematics and reading comprehension. In addition, the results show an increased difference in results between groups of students with different socio-economic backgrounds.,

What the articles dealing with the PISA survey have in common is that they use the results of the PISA surveys, without in any way critically examining the PISA survey, critically examining the results and questioning their validity. Rarely or never do you see an article that scientifically critically examines the PISA examinations.

It is important to highlight criticisms of the PISA surveys and its principal, the OECD, specifically criticisms relating to the content and quality of the PISA surveys and its interpretation and use of the results. There are good reasons to question the PISA examinations. In my opinion Sweden should leave the PISA examinations since they add absolutely nothing new!

As a researcher, you naturally say that both non-response and response rate affect the final result. That is basic knowledge. The PISA survey is losing relevance, says Norwegian professor Svein Sjöberg at the University of Oslo. He thinks, just like me, that Sweden should leave the survey. Using the survey as a measure of quality in Swedish schools is absurd because it is not quality that is being measured.

In summary: Sweden should leave the PISA project.
